Overview

This would seem practical but, in recent years, I have been somewhat preoccupied by thinking forward. Indeed, it is the nature of my role to be thinking to the future and creating a path towards new, bigger and better goals. It just so happens, though, that the most pressing current forward-view in question is to our bicentenary in 2026 - a Herculean effort of expansive proportions... but I get ahead of myself.

In looking forward, I am reminded that all which we have achieved in 2024 was once planned for and poured over. It took time and energy to slot into place. The story of our 2024 is wide-reaching and encompasses effort from Academicians, Committees, RSA staff, advisors, partner venues, Scottish art schools, exhibiting artists, artists making applications, stakeholders, cultural institutions, RSA Friends and Patrons, business clients, supporters... The list goes on and the fruits of our combined effort are here to be explored in these pages.

2024 has been a difficult year for the arts sector in Scotland. As the financial climate has changed and arts venues are concerned about their funding and how to support their initiatives, we are only too aware of the impact of this worry. As an independent, self-financing institution, these concerns have been all too prevalent for us for many years. We are an institution which is approaching our 200th anniversary and the trials and tribulations of merely existing have been tried and tested (again and again!). However, this uncertainty has borne resilience. Building interest and support has continued to enable us to make investments, which, in turn, assist us to pass on support to artists and architects through our numerous programmes.

Our Academicians are at the very heart of all this activity. From steering developments at Committee level through to selecting awards and convening projects, every element of our output has these leading practitioners at its core. Our Collections have evolved under this ethos too. Recognised as a Nationally Significant Collection by the Scottish Government, this terrific resource of Scottish art has been brought together, not by a succession of curators, but rather, by a continuous Academy of Scottish artists and architects which dates back over two centuries.

Outward-looking, with the gravitas of historic stability, the Academy can bring the wealth of experience from its membership to the fore, examining every strand of our own activity to enable wider support for Scottish artists and architects. As we build towards RSA200, we continue to investigate the necessity for onward support and trust that we can continue to expand upon and deliver our work across Scotland. Now entering our 199th year, it is a great privilege to look back over the year-gone-by and see the impact we have made. It is also exciting to look ahead to what cultural riches may come... and come they will, I'm sure of it.



Version Galore: All Art Comes from Other Art

30 March - 24 April 2024 RSA President's Room and Friends' Corridor

Version Galore brought together works by third year students at Edinburgh College of Art (ECA), created in response to the Royal Scottish Academy's Collections.

Students at ECA were given the unique opportunity by lecturer Kenny Hunter RSA to research and study RSA Collections first-hand. The RSA collection was established almost 200 years ago and contains over 10,000 artworks today. It is a dynamic, growing collection built by artists for artists.

Each student artist was asked to select and respond to an individual work by making their own interpretation of it, either homage, copy, influence or critique. The resulting works on view in Version Galore were accompanied by some of the items from the RSA Collection that informed their inspiration.





Since our foundation in 1826, international artists have been part of the fabric of the Royal Scottish Academy and have helped to shape the wider story of art in Scotland. In 2020, our Collections received a significant studio gift from the family of sculptor Benno Schotz RSA (1891-1984), who came to Scotland from Estonia in 1912. This exhibition showcases this important gift alongside the work of first-generation immigrant artists who have made Scotland their home and have gone on to be elected as Royal Scottish Academicians.





RSA William Littlejohn Award for Water-based Media

Sarah Casey

Sarah Casey primarily works in drawing, exhibiting works with paper that test the limits of visibility and material existence. She collaborates with scientists and museum collections, and is currently responding to the precarity of glacial archaeology, making watercolours with glacial sediments on glass.

Sarah plans to use the £2,000 award to expand her graphic practice by shifting from drawing to explore indexical potential of print, making screenrprints using water-based inks made from glacial flour gathered from post glacial sites in Switzerland and Scotland.

The award will enable Sarah to enroll in multiple workshops at Glasgow Print Studio, plus self directed bench time and 1:1 support. The outcome will be a series of paired screenprints – one using pigment and negatives from fieldwork in Switzerland, the other using sediment from the loch behind her home, and other Scottish sites, deposited by retreating ice 11,000 years ago.

William Littlejohn RSA (1929-2006) was a highly distinguished Scottish artist practicing largely in watercolour and collage-based media. In 2006, Littlejohn gifted the contents of his studio to the RSA. Works from this bequest have been exhibited across Scotland, and the proceeds of the sales of any works go to supporting artists via the RSA William Littlejohn Award.





RSA Lens-based Media Award

IRVINE & SPENCE

Zoë Irvine and Pernille Spence began collaborating as IRVINE & SPENCE in 2015. Their work is a combination of ideas from their individual practices in sound, performance and film.

IRVINE & SPENCE plan to use the £4,000 award funds to create a multiscreen installation that plays with the choreography of image and sound within both the physical space and an artists' film. They look to confront the notion of 'borrowing against the future', exploring ideas of precarity, teetering and collapse. The work will be created at Hospitalfield, Arbroath and Generator Projects, Dundee.

'We aim to confront the pervasive notion of 'borrowing against the future', with the inevitable reckoning of deferred debts becoming central. Our interest in potential, teetering and collapse, which began in GETTING OK, now intersects with the concept of impact. Yet there is no cathartic resolution, the moment of dissolution never materialises. Instead, we find ourselves in a perpetual state of imminence—a constant balancing act where the promised clean breakage that would allow for re-evaluation and reconstruction remains elusive. We are aiming to explore quite a bleak contemporary experience in a playful way through this body of challenging yet relatable work.'







RSA MacRobert Art Award for Painting

Steven MacIver

Funded by the MacRobert Trust, the RSA MacRobert Art Award provides the time and financial assistance for a committed painter whose circumstances have, for whatever reason, made it difficult to focus upon and develop their artistic talent. Steven will use this £20,000, to a 12-month period of research and development for a new body of work. His paintings are built around perspective driven frameworks which create the illusion of space and depth by layering and removing paint. Steven grew up in Orkney and has spent the past 20 years between London, Rome and Oxfordshire. He intends to use the award funds to explore the theme of 'homecoming,' celebrating the diverse natural and cultural heritage of Scotland.

He will examine interior and exterior spaces throughout Scotland, from the structured interior of the National Museum of Scotland to the more domestic space of a bothy in the Cairngorms. Steven will focus on developing a body of work that unites the various elements of his practice through the juxtaposition of hard-edged, perspective-driven line and natural organic forms.

Steven said: 'I am absolutely delighted to have been awarded the 2024 RSA MacRobert Art Award for Painting. I am deeply grateful to the MacRobert Trust and the Royal Scottish Academy for providing this extraordinary opportunity, which will allow me to focus on developing my practice and building a new body of work over the next 12 months. This award is a real honour and I look forward to getting into the studio to begin my project.'



RSA Blackadder Houston Mid-career Painting Award

Moyna Flannigan

Funded by the RSA Blackadder Houston Bequest, this £20,000 award intends to enable a committed painter to devote themselves exclusively to painting for a period up to 26 weeks, that would otherwise be impeded by other commitments, such as employment or caring responsibilities.

Edinburgh-based artist Moyna Flannigan's practice centres on the representation of women in painting. Her works are an amalgamation of memory, experience and imagination, drawn from history, mythology and popular culture. She is dedicated to Painting as a discipline and medium, and addresses the development of visual language in her work by engaging with current dialogues around making and materiality.

Flannigan intends to use the award funds to embark on a period of research in central Italy of the spatial geometry, earthly colour and light of the panel paintings and frescoes of the quattrocento painters: Piero della Francesca, Tommaso Masaccio, Luca Signorelli and Andrea Mantegna. She will create her own paints to replicate the luminosity and sensuality of early painting, exploring how sculptural light activates an image within the spatial dynamics of a painting.

Moyna Flannigan said, 'I'm really delighted to receive this painting award from the RSA, and especially pleased that it comes from the legacy of Elizabeth Blackadder and John Houston who were such generous teachers when I was a student at Edinburgh College of Art. Now that I teach there myself, and I am at a different stage in my painting life, I am conscious, as perhaps they were, that painting helps me to teach, and teaching helps me to paint.

'I am looking forward to the extra studio time that this award facilitates and to making paintings which look outwards and forwards into the future.'



Dame Elizabeth Blackadder RSA (1931-2021) and John Houston RSA (1930-2008) were influential and beloved artists, working mostly in painting and printmaking. Through both their roles as educators at Edinburgh College of Art, and their careers as individually successful artists, the couple left an indelible impression on Scottish art. In 2022 the RSA received a significant bequest from the Blackadder Houston estate, and in accordance with Elizabeth's wishes, this Bequest supports a variety of opportunities for artists, including the RSA Blackadder Houston Mid-career Painting Award and the RSA Blackadder Houston Mid-career Travel Awards.

RSA Blackadder Houston Mid-career Travel Awards

Olivia Irvine

This £5,000 award enables a committed fine art painter to carry out research, development and production of a new body of work through a period of international travel.

Olivia Irvine uses a combination of the imagined and the observed to create her paintings, altering and intensifying memories to achieve a dreamlike and theatrical quality. Irvine will travel to South America to research how literature has influenced the theatricality and dream-like sensibilities of contemporary South American painting. She will create a new body of work inspired by her mother's centenary year, exploring how imagination, lived experience, stories, and memories intersect in painting.

Olivia Irvine said: 'I am delighted to have won this award. I remember both Elizabeth and John from my student days at Edinburgh College of Art, and they always had something interesting to say about painting and travel. It has long been a dream of mine to go to South America and this award is finally giving me that opportunity. I plan to go to Chile and Argentina during their spring and take a bundle of concertina sketchbooks with me. There are dozens of museums, art galleries and murals in the cities and I want to visit as many as possible. I definitely want to see the Pablo Neruda houses in Chile as I am a fan of his poetry. I admire several Magic Realist authors and will seek out their influence on contemporary painting as well as my own work.'

Derrick Guild RSA

This £5,000 award enables a Royal Scottish Academician that is a committed fine art painter to carry out research, development and production of a new body of work through a period of international travel.

Derrick Guild RSA's paintings reference the European still life paintings of the 15th-19th centuries. The drama, allegory and naturalism inherent in this period of painting speak to Guild of ever-present dilemmas of the human condition. His works are classical, formal and at the same time contemporary in their sense of dislocation and ambiguity. Guild will use the award funds to visit the Netherlands, viewing the ongoing public accessed restoration of Paulus Potter's 1647 painting, The Young Bull.

Derrick Guild RSA said: 'This award will allow me to make 3 visits to the Mauritshuis Museum in the Hague, where the restoration of Paulus Potter's 1647 painting The Young Bull is underway until the end of 2025. Completed when Potter was just 22 years of age, the painting is nearly life size. It's such a playful and commanding depiction of a sentient living creature. When I look at reproductions of the painting, I am hit with a myriad of connections, connections that include prehistoric cave painting, Frans Snyders, Walt Disney and my childhood visits to the bull sales in Perth.'

Development

Grants

- We were successful with our application to Museums Galleries Scotland's Museums Development fund for our Partners Across Scotland project in 2026. The grant of £60,000 will cover the costs of a Project Manager for development in 2025 and delivery in 2026.
- We also continue to increase our use of our Google grant and this year we received over £16,000 of in-kind support for Google ads promoting the RSA Collection, Friends programme and entries for the RSA Annual Exhibition.

Sponsorship

We added two new sponsors this year in addition to retaining all of our current sponsors.

- XPPen, a company which makes digital drawing tablets came on board as an associate sponsor for the Schools Art Awards, providing drawing tablets as prizes for the winners as well as cash support.

- We continued to grow the Patrons programme. The core of the programme continues to be: two luncheons featuring talks from Academicians, and an invitation to the Varnishing Day lunch. - Part of the Patrons' annual contributions were put toward the restoration/conservation costs for some of the works exhibited in *Benno Schotz and A Scots Miscellany* and the Patrons were given a presentation by exhibition curator and Head of Collections, Sandy Wood.







2026 Fundraising: A Blueprint for Belonging

At the end of the year, we launched **A Blueprint for Belonging**, our fundraising campaign aimed at the RSA Friends.

For a donation of £200, which will directly support our bicentennial programme, the donors receive a bespoke printmaking kit designed by master printmaker Leena Nammari RSA. The kit will enable them to make an artwork that addresses the prompt 'what does belonging mean to you?'.

Using the kit, they will create a cyanotype print by placing objects or drawings on top of hand treated paper and exposing it to the sun. The kit includes a variety of ready-made cyanotype paper, tracing paper to print an image or draw onto, a pre-printed photograph of the RSA created by Leena Nammari that is ready for exposure, and an exclusive thank you print made by Leena herself. With these materials, they can craft an A5 sized artwork that will be housed in the RSA Collection, contributing to a unique project that symbolises and celebrates the enduring legacy of the RSA Friends.

This collaborative project is open to all skill levels. To support their creative process, they'll have the opportunity to join Leena in the gallery on select dates in 2025. During these sessions, she'll discuss her practice, share insights into techniques they can use and answer any questions to help guide them in making their artwork.

At the end of the project in spring 2026, the participants will be invited to an exclusive gathering during the 200th Annual Exhibition. Participants will come together to showcase their artworks in an evening of celebration. It will be a moment to come together, share stories, and celebrate the vital role the RSA Friends play in the Academy's legacy.

Afterwards, these works will be placed in a time capsule and sealed for 60 years until the 100th anniversary of the RSA Friends. Preserved within our Nationally Recognised Collection, the capsule will be opened in 2086, providing a snapshot for future generations of what belonging meant in 2026.

The campaign will run for all of 2025 and will run alongside additional campaigns aimed at general audiences and our Patrons.







DIPLOMA TALK: PAUL STALLAN RSA

21 March 2024, Oxford House, Glasgow

Paul Stallan RSA is the acclaimed director of Stallan-Brand architects. With a rich background in architecture and a portfolio boasting award-winning projects, Stallar brings a unique perspective to the intersection of art and design.

Central to our collection is the Diploma Collection - works which have been selected by artists and architects as a condition of their election as an Academician. The first group were deposited in 1831 and the collection is added to every year as new Academicians are elected. Its unique identity lies in its direct connection to the practitioners which grow it, and as such it tells a distinctively personal history of Scottish art and architecture.

In this inaugural talk of our new event series, Stallan guided us through his gallery and studio, offering a rare behind-the-scenes look at his creative process. The highlight of the evening was an in-depth discussion with RSA's Head of Collections, Sandy Wood, which focused on Stallan's proposed diploma deposit.

THE ART AND LIFE OF BET LOW RSA 13 June 2024, RSA Lower Galleries

City Streets, Scottish Islands and Silhouetted Hills, a talk on the art and Life of Bet Low RSA given by Hildegarde Berwick, coincided with the 100th anniversary of Bet Low RSA's birth. Bet was born in Gourock and from 1945 Glasgow became her home after completing her studies at Glasgow School of Art. Her long career started initially creating theatre sets for Glasgow Unity Theatre. The artist is best known today for her tranquil landscape scenes of Scottish islands, particularly Orkney. Bet won many awards throughout her career, including the distinction of election to ARSA in 1988

Hildegarde Berwick studied History of Fine Art and Psychology at Glasgow University and a post-graduate Diploma at Manchester University. She has held a number of curatorial roles in galleries across Scotland. She has also worked for Scotlish charities in a governance role. Hildegarde is now pursuing several project including researching the life and work of Glasgow based artist, Bet Low RSA.



THE RSA WILLIAM GILLIES LECTURE: WILLIAM GILLIES REBORN

25 September 2024, Hawthornden Lecture Theatre, Royal Scottish Academy

This year's RSA William Gillies Lecture focused on the life and work of the acclaimed artist himself. The lecture coincided with our Gillies exhibition tour travelling around Scotland.

We welcomed Sandy Wood, Alexander Moffat RSA, Dr Joanna Soden HRSA and Andrew McPherson to the Academy, who each presented a series of short talks on the life and work of Sir William Gillies. This was followed by a discussion chaired by Murdo Macdonald HRSA and inspired by the themes explored in Andrew McPherson publication, William Gillies: Modernism and Nation in British Art. The lecture also celebrated the publication by Edinburgh University Press of Andrew's full scholarly monograph on Gillies, which presents the entirety of his revelatory research and writing on the artist.

New Academicians

Claire Barclay RSA (Elect)


Claire Barclay works predominantly with sculpture and print practices and is recognized for her large-scale installations informed by the contexts in which they temporarily exist. These include, *Thrum*, produced for MAC Belfast and *Yield Point*, made in response to Tramway, Glasgow.

Her work engages a wide range of hand making and fabrication processes to explore the nature of materials, methods of production, and relationships between people and objects. Different elements provoke ideas as to possible scenarios and interactions in relation to the human body. She is interested in how people are affected by material and form both physically and psychologically, and comprehend these by engaging a sophisticated and primal understanding of the tactile world we inhabit.

Earlier this year she exhibited *RAWLESS* at Cample Line in Dumfriesshire. Other notable exhibitions include *Low Scenic*, an installation at the Pilazzo Giustinian-Lolin, Venice Biennale 2003. A retrospective *Openwide*, at The Fruitmarket Gallery in Edinburgh in 2009. *Shadow Spans* at the Whitechapel Art Gallery in London, *Pale Heights*, 2009, Mudam, Luxembourg, *Shifting Ground*, 2008, Camden Arts Centre, London, and *Fault on the right side*, 2007, Kunstverein Braunschweig, *Bright Bodies*, as part of Glasgow International Festival 2016 and a commission for the Gwangju Biennale 2016.

Throughout her career she has integrated engaged practices, teaching within art schools and collaborating within other fields including architecture and dance. She has worked for a number of years with vulnerable people through Artlink Edinburgh. Recent projects include integrated artworks for a new Library in Paisley designed by Collective Architecture, and a permanent commission for Putney Foreshore in London.





Ken Currie RSA (Elect)

Ken Currie is renowned for his unsettling portrayal of the human figure. The artist's rich, luminous paintings depict mysterious rites, rituals, and quasi-medical practices, offering a meditation on violence in its many guises.

Currie studied at the Glasgow School of Art from 1978-1983 and rose to attention within a generation of painters known as the 'New Glasgow Boys' in the 1980s. In 1987, Currie completed a powerful series of large scale History paintings for the People's Palace in Glasgow. Through the 90's deeply affected by humanitarian events in Eastern Europe Currie's works evolved, his focus shifting to confront ideas of mortality and corruption, both physical and moral. Over the last 10 years Currie's work has addressed the horrors of the contemporary world, without shying away from their brutality or grotesque nature. His painting *Unknown Man*, a portrait of the eminent Forensic Anthropologist Sue Black was acquired for the Scottish National Portrait Gallery in 2022. A new book *Ken Currie Paintings and Writings*, was published in 2023.

Ken Currie has exhibited widely internationally, including a 2013 solo exhibition at the Scottish National Portrait Gallery which also commissioned his painting *Three Oncologists*. Currie's work is held in many major public collections including Tate, London; Scottish National Gallery of Modern Art, Edinburgh; Montreal Museum of Contemporary Art; McMaster Museum of Contemporary Art, Hamilton, Ontario; Campbelltown Arts Centre, New South Wales; Yale Center for British Art, New Haven; Gulbenkian Foundation, Lisbon; and the British Council, London.

Barry McGlashan RSA (Elect)

Barry McGlashan (RSA elect) was born in Aberdeen in 1974. He studied Drawing and Painting at Grays School of Art, graduating in 1996.

He returned to the Painting Department at Grays in 1998 and taught there until 2005 when he left to pursue painting full-time.

His paintings take place between the memories of places visited, old photographs, passages from literature, and remembered scenes from films - with the constant being his interest in the materiality of paint and surface.

All these truths and fictions become mixed in painterly distortion and the resulting mutability of a remembered image or event is shared as subject and object. There is a fascinating relationship between the visual of the original source and its changing representation over the intervening time spent painting in the studio. I find an innate beauty in that, like the fragility of recollection... Each painting is a sum of time spent, just as we could be said to be the sum of our memories. Each element, each mark is a layer of time... But somewhere in the centre of all that thinking and making runs a seam of common intention: a desire to explore and evoke shared experience.

He regularly exhibits both nationally and internationally with examples of his work being held in numerous private and public collections. He has been the recipient of many awards throughout his career and in 2019, was invited to exhibit a special work in the Rubenshuis museum, within the historic studio of Peter Paul Rubens, in Antwerp.

He now lives and works in Edinburgh.





Caroline Walker RSA (Elect)


Caroline Walker's paintings explore the performance of gender identity, femininity, and question the norms of depicting women and the female form across a range of socio-economic contexts. Blurring the boundary between objectivity and lived experience, Walker highlights the often overlooked jobs performed by women and the psychologically charged spaces they inhabit.

Born in Dunfermline (UK), where she also currently lives and works, Walker received a BA in Painting from Glasgow School of Art in 2004 and an MA in Painting from The Royal College of Art in 2009.



In Memoriam

Andrew Merrylees RSA, DipTP, FRIAS, FCSD, FRSA

31 October 1933 - 10 January 2024

Born 13 October 1933, Andrew studied at the School of Architecture, Glasgow School of Art, remaining there to complete a diploma in town planning. He was a student assistant in the practice of Basil Spence & Partners in 1952 and was promoted to architect in 1957, although he was not admitted ARIBA until 1959.

In 1968 he was appointed associate in the Spence firm, by then known as Sir Basil Spence, Glover & Ferguson. At that time John Hardie Glover was the firm's senior partner, Spence having retired that year and Ferguson having died three years before. Merrylees was taken into partnership in 1972.

Merrylees left the Spence firm in 1985 to set up his own practice as Andrew Merrylees Associates, which became Andrew Merrylees, Grierson & Robertson in 1994 and Merrylees & Robertson in November 1997. In January 2001 the practice was merged with Hypostyle Architects and became consultant offices in Glasgow, Edinburgh and Hamilton. While maintaining his own practice, Andrew, became an external examiner at various schools of Architecture and visiting tutor at the Universities of Strathclyde and Dundee for over thirty years during which he became the external examiner in Interior Design at the Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art and Design.

On 22 March 1984, Andrew Merrylees, was elected as an ARSA of the Royal Scottish Academy, becoming a full RSA in 1991 and exhibited at the academy for over 50 years, later turning his hand to watercolours. An active member of the academy, Andrew served on various committees and held the positions of Internal Auditor for three years and in 1996 was elected at Assembly to be Deputy President for one year to the then President, William Baillie PPRSA.

A decorated Architect, Andrew, received awards such as the RIBA Bronze Medal, Saltire Award, Civic Trust Award, Art in Architecture Award, RSA Gillies Award and the RSA Gold Medal. Architect, Artist, Designer and town planner he lived and worked in Edinburgh and Frejus, France drawing inspiration from both locations for all works.





Ian Howard RSA

7 November 1952 - 7 September 2024

Born in Aberdeen on 7 November 1952, Ian Howard RSA studied at Edinburgh College of Art (1970 - 1975) and then Post-Graduate School (1976 - 1977), also at the ECA. No stranger to awards for his work, he was awarded the Helen Rose Travelling Scholarship to Italy in 1976/77 where he studied in Florence, Siena, Venice and Milan. In 1979 he received the RSA Guthrie award, 1983 the Scottish Art Council Award, 1984 – 1985 Scottish Arts Council Major Bursary, 1990 the William Gillies Bequest Scholarship, 1991 British Art Council Grant and in 2000, the Chicago Prize from the John Mooney Foundation.

On 16th March 1983, Ian was elected to the rank of Associate of the Royal Scottish Academy (ARSA) and on 18 November 1998, along with Joyce W. Cairns PPRSA, was elected to the rank of full Academician. Ian was an active member during his time as an Academician and his wealth of experience was regularly called upon in the committee structure and his roles of member of the New Contemporaries hanging committee in 2010 and Treasurer of the Academy 2007 – 2013.

Holding many prestigious positions in the world of art, lan was a Lecturer in Painting at Gray's School of Art, Aberdeen, member of the board of Directors of the Fruitmarket Gallery, Edinburgh, studied and worked at the British School at Rome, board of Directors of Dundee Contemporary Arts, Dean of the Faculty of Duncan of Jordanstone, Principal of Edinburgh College of Art, Trustee of the National Galleries of Scotland and Emeritus Professor of Art, University of Edinburgh.

Between 1995 and 1997 Ian was commissioned by the publishers Random House in London, Henry Holt in New York and St Martin's Press, New York to design the covers for seven of Salman Rushdie's novels.

A multi skilled artist lan's practice incorporated painting, drawing and printmaking and focused on themes including art and science, alchemical symbolism, hermeticism, emblems, medieval and renaissance iconography. His work has been acquired for more than thirty public, university and corporate art collections.

lan exhibited in solo, and group shows at Talbot Rice Gallery, Compass Gallery, Peacock Printmakers, Pier Centre in Orkney, Printworks in Chicago, Open Eye, Third Eye Centre, Fine Art Society in Edinburgh and Glasgow amongst many others. Most recently, lan showed at the Academy, Constructed Narratives, first shown at Aberdeen Art Gallery in winter 2023, focusing on the significance of construction, whether physical or implied. A joint show along with lifelong friends Lennox Dunbar RSA and Arthur Watson PPRSA, each artist used building, layering and installation in different ways to create their own narratives that explored how these themes have shaped their careers.





Alastair Salvesen HRSA

29 July 1941 - 9 December 2024

Alastair Salvesen HRSA CBE was a leading figure in the Scottish seafood industry and patron of the arts in Scotland. In 2011, he was awarded a CBE for services to the arts and charity in Scotland.

Alastair was a great grandson of shipping magnate Christian Salvesen. Born in Fife, he was educated at Fettes College, Edinburgh and Cranfield University. Alastair was a Chartered Accountant, a Director of Archangels, Chairman of Dawnfresh Seafoods Ltd and a director of several other companies. He was Deputy Chairman of the Fettes Trust and a past president of the Royal Highland and Agricultural Society, and the British Frozen Foods Federation.

A philanthropist of the arts in Scotland, Alastair initiated the Alastair Salvesen Art Scholarship for painters (administered by the RSA) in 1989. This award continued until 2010. Alastair was elected an Honorary Member of the Royal Scottish Academy in 2001.
